

Patrick Bane Died Saturday

Patrick Bane, a Jerseyville farmer, died at eight o'clock Saturday morning, November 1, at St. Joseph's Hospital in Alton where he had been a patient for several days. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Bane was born in St. Louis, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Bane, and he has made his home in Jersey County for many years. He is survived by one brother, James Bane, of Jerseyville, and three sisters, Mrs. Mary Keohane of Lowell, Massachusetts, Mrs. Julia Fahey and Miss Agnes Bane of Jerseyville.

Funeral services were held at St. Francis Xavier's Church Tuesday morning, November 4, at nine-thirty o'clock. Reverend Father John J. Clancy was celebrant of the Requiem Mass and interment was in St. Francis Cemetery.

MEMORIAL AT KANE SUNDAY FOR MARINE

Body Of Corporal Jesse
Petton Arrived Here
Tuesday. Kane Legion
To Assist At Rites.

The first Memorial Service locally for a returned veteran of World War II will be held for Corporal Jesse Petton of Kane whose body arrived in Jerseyville Tuesday afternoon with military escort and was taken to Jacoby Brothers Chapel.

The Memorial Service will be held at the Methodist Church in Kane Sunday afternoon, November 9, at two o'clock with the pastor, Reverend Harry Fish, officiating. The Kane American Legion Post will assist with the rites and interment will be in the Kane Cemetery.

The flag-draped casket will be moved from the Chapel here to the Church at one o'clock Sunday afternoon.

The body of the young Marine was one of over three thousand that arrived in San Francisco, California, Friday, October 10, aboard the Honda Knot. Corporal Petton, a member of the Marine Corps, was reported dead in a communication received by his parents on May 13, 1943. His death occurred on May 11.

The young man enlisted in the Marine Corps on January 3, 1932, and received his training at San Francisco, California. After six months training he left for foreign service. The young Marine participated in the battles in the Solomon Islands and Guadalcanal.

Petton was born in Hillsboro, Illinois, October 1, 1918. He lived in Kane for fifteen years and was graduated from the Kane and Carrollton High Schools.

bombers and other aircraft to fields in England, rising through grades of lieutenancy to captain.

After his separation from service Mr. Lewis resided at the Lewis property near Delhi for a time, and then moved to Springfield where for the past year he has been connected with the state aeronautics bureau.

Long-Time Teacher Left For New Home

Miss Lora Lane who has the record of serving longer in the Medora schools than any other teacher, left Friday for East St. Louis where she plans to reside with her sister, Mrs. T. J. Mannle. Prior to her departure Miss Lane sold her residence property and disposed of her household goods in Medora.

Miss Lane started her teaching career in the Medora schools in 1901 under the late W. J. Chapman, and continued in her profession until 1932. During that time she taught in three different school houses, first in the old schoolhouse where the Day home now stands. Later the school was moved into what is now the Medora Grade School building, and in 1930 she began her work in the new high school building.

She taught eighteen years in the the Medora grades where in 1919 she started the first eighth grade commencement exercises. Her last thirteen years of teaching were in the high school, where she taught mathematics, world history, home economics and music.

In addition to her teaching, Miss Lane took an active part in the civic and religious life in Medora. She was actively engaged in the work of the Methodist Church, where she was superintendent of the Sunday School for seventeen years and was choir director for twenty-five years. Upon leaving she resigned her position as teacher of the Esther Class.

Miss Lane also served as chairman of the program committee of the Medora Barbecue Association for fifteen years.
